FROM OUR CHAIR

Kīoranga kotou

Hope that you are all keeping well and warm during the colder winter months. Thoughts are with our hūnau in South and Mid-Canterbury who were deluged with heavy rains and flooding at the end of May.



The hearing of submissions on the Moriori Claims Settlement Bill was held at Kōpinga Marae on May 8th. This was the first time that a Select Committee has held hearings at a marae so another first for Moriori! The hearings went well, and I think that the Māori Affairs Select Committee (MASC) understood very well the challenges that Moriori face after their visit to Rēkohu.

Special thanks are made to those members and supporters who made submissions and spoke to them at the hearing including Susan Thorpe, Kiwa Hammond, Erin King, Grace Le Gros, Professor David Williams of Auckland University, Associate Prof Ian Barber from University of Otago and Barrister Chris Griggs who copresented the submissions on behalf of HMT and MIST. It was somewhat disappointing to see such a low turnout from local members for both the Hokomaurahiri on Friday and the hearing on Saturday. However, for those who did make an effort to show up to support the marae and the Bill process, your attendance was much appreciated.

The next stages are for the MASC to consider all the submissions and report to the House of Parliament with any recommended changes. We have requested a few changes to the Bill to both strengthen the theme of the Bill and to ensure that Moriori customary rights are given full effect including in the Marine and Coastal Areas Act.

Members will be advised of the next appearance at Parliament for the final reading of the Bill which will likely be towards the end of this year. It is hoped that there will be a good turnout from our people to celebrate this historic occasion when the settlement will finally be passed into law.

Another milestone to be acknowledged is the pending publication of the online e-book called 'Kā Kakepunga Kōrero' which is a book designed to inform and educate young people and teachers about Moriori history and stories. As set out Teacher Aid Notes:

The texts in this resource begin with a creation story and move on to the settlement, encounters with other peoples, and a view through the eyes of children on Rēkohu today. These notes are provided to offer support for engaging with the stories and to scaffold teachers and students through a variety of activities as they encounter ta rē Moriori and tikane (protocols) for the first time. As you initially explore each story, encourage students to ask rich questions about what they see in the illustrations, and encourage them to use their prior knowledge and experience as a way of gaining meaning from the text. The teacher's notes provide guidance on vocabulary and grammar. The language app will be a useful addition to a language toolbox for working with this resource.

I wish to acknowledge the hard work of the dedicated team of Kiwa Hammond, Susan Thorpe and Cognition Education (Bill Gaynor) for pulling this valuable resource together in readiness for publication. Together with the Ta Rē language app this will help form a basis for the revival of interest and education about Moriori language and culture. This is but the beginning of a long journey to revive the speaking of ta re Moriori. I encourage each and every one of our people and anyone else who has an interest to take up the challenge of learning ta rē!

There has also been a lot of focus and media attention on the need to teach Moriori history in New Zealand schools as part of our national education curriculum. HMT has been and continues to engage in a dialogue with Ministry of Education to ensure that Moriori history is given its proper place in the history of our nation.

It is trustee election time again and it is encouraging to see a large number of applicants for the positions available. So, get out there and vote in the upcoming election! Voting starts on 14 June and closes on 17 July.

RECENT EVENTS

Submissions to the Moriori Settlement Bill

On 8 May the Māori Select Committee heard submissions to the Moriori Settlement Bill at Kōpinga Marae. As far as we know this is the first time the Committee has heard evidence on a marae and marks a significant change in practice. The Manawa of the marae was handed to the Committee Chair, Tamati Coffey, for the duration of the hearing.



The Committee were also taken on a site visit to look at areas affected by redress offers and also places affected amendments requested. The Hokotehi submission focussed on proposed amendments to recognition of ta rē Moriori language, the teaching of Moriori history in the new curriculum, greater

protection for wāhi tchap', and changes to reflect the legislation concerning the Marine and Coastal legislation.

A full video transcript of all submissions given on the day is available on the HMT facebook page as well as the Select Committee facebook page.



In all there were 58 written submissions to the Bill, most in support. These are in the public record and can be read on the Select Committee website: https://www.parliament.nz/en/pb/bills-and-laws/bills-proposed-laws/document/BILL 96375/moriori-claims-settlement-bill

The NZ Rock Loster and Pāua Industries submissions were heard at Parliament a week before the Rēkohu hearing.

The Committee is charged with preparing a report on the Bill and its submissions. This is due in August 2021, after which the second reading will be heard in parliament. We hope that a third reading will occur in 2021 but this is subject to the Parliamentary calendar. The third reading will be a chance for members to attend and we hope that we can get as many of our members to come along as possible.



Marae Event Attendence

Moriori language and cultural revival is at the heart of everything that we do. We are making progress with these goals in many ways. We look forward to seeing more people feeling comfortable to stand around the pou and use some ta rē Moriori during hokomaurahiri. We are always keen to welcome imi members to wānanga. Recent wānanga have included weaving, language, predator free and regenerative farming. And of course we have recently seen history in the making with the sitting of the Māori Affairs Select Committee at Kōpinga Marae (to hear submissions on the Moriori Deed of Settlement Bill) together with hokomaurahiri and dinner the evening prior.

We have been suprised by a low level of attendance from Imi Moriori at each of these events and seek feedback from you as to how we can realise our vision for events like these to be well attended and sought after.

In response to the poor attendance numbers, Hokotehi would like to consult with Imi members via a short confidential survey, to gather input on how we can encourage members to attend events at their marae. Members have the opportunity to voice what events and workshops they would like to see held at Kōpinga. Please watch for this survey in the coming weeks.

Predator Wānanga - spotlight on Kōpi research



Hokotehi is a case study participant in an MBIE project with Landcare Research/Manaaki Whenua looking at innovative indigenous approaches to predator management. We were fortunate to be able to bring together some of the sharpest minds on this topic for 3 days of sharing knowledge and ideas. The Landcare team brought together Mahuru Wilcox, Patrick Garvey, Al Glen and Tame Malcolm, co-chair of Predator Free Knowledge and Innovation Group and biosecurity champion at Tira Whakamātaki.

During his PhD research project, Manaaki Whenua scientist Patrick Garvey discovered that the scent of large predators (e.g. the feral cat Felis catus or ferret Mustela furo) is a powerful attractant for smallers predators (e.g. stoat, Mustela erminea). A non-toxic, natural lure suitable for use in all environments has been developed from this project, and is already being used by a small number of conservation groups across the North Island. It has been achieving great results in increasing stoat capture rates at four conservation project trials. Patrick has also started a research project to develop a 'super lure' for stoats and weasels — a synthetic lure that performs as well as or better than the natural scent.

We are also using machine learning to develop software that will automatically identify animals in camera trap images, redicuing the time spent and the cost of image processing by an order of magnitude. Researcher Al Glen has been working with Dr Greg Falzon from the University of New England in Australia on image recognition software that identifies animal species from trail camera images. The software needs thousands of images of a species to learn to recognise it reliably, but with continuing refinements accuracy is expected to exceed 95%.


The wānanga also brought in staff from DOC's technical support personnel and the specialist Island Eradication Advisory team (Keith Broome and Stephen Horn), along with our own island predator control specialists Mike Bell, Hamish Tuanui-Chisholm (CI Landscape Restoration Co-ordinator) and HMT tchieki henu, Duane Trafford. Duane represented findings on a Hokotehi research project that tested the use of Kōpi berries as lures. This is an ongoing project that has revealed som potential uses for eradication of possums.

Kā Kakepunga Kōrero – Short stories

In 2020 Hokotehi was a grant recipient from the Ministry of Education to develop some learning resources for its website, Te Aho Ngārahu. We worked alongside Cognition Ltd with our ta rē translator, Kiwa Hammond, to write a set of 5 small stories. These will shortly be available on the internet along with teacher notes and guidelines.

We are very excited about this project – it marks an important milestone in our language strategy and also the first time ta rē Moriori has been comprehensively used on the internet.

We have called the collection **Kā Kakepunga Kōrero**. Kakepunga is a Moriori word meaning a small bundle of sticks used to kindle a fire.



The inspiration for the Te Aho Ngārahu fund is embodied in its name – the brightly burning embers within the ashes of a fire. It is also so very apt for where Moriori are in our language development. We have used 'homauri' (to awaken) and "kaunaki' (to kindle) as the starter words for our language revival project and we are happy to see the embers of rē Moriori starting to glow with the publication of these stories to the internet.

The last fluent speakers of ta rē Moriori passed away in the early 1900s but our language has not been in common or even open usage since 1836. Today it has no recognition as an official language of New Zealand and its uniqueness is only now being realised, respected and enjoyed. We are fortunate to have archival records written from the 1860s onwards that document Moriori vocabulary (tukupa) and show differences in pronuciation such as the use of 'tch' and clipped endings (e.g tchap' for tapu) as well differences in words compared with te reo Māori. In fact, there seem to be stronger connections with Tahiti, the Marquesan group and Avaiki (Cook Airani).

Language offers and affirms so many clues to cultural origins and identity. The ability to speak our own language and share it with the world is one of the most

important aspirations for Moriori. We have looked at ways to bring it back to our marae (Kōpinga), to our work-place and homes. Bringing it into our schools is seen as being the next phase for its revival not just on Rēkohu but throughout Aotearoa/New Zealand.

Three of these five stories focus on aspects on Moriori cultural origins and the other two look at more recent history. We envision these as being the first set of 10 stories that are reflections of the ten pillars of Rangitokona, the etchu (deity) that gently separated his parents Pāpātūanuk' and Ranginui. The stories come from our own oral traditions and the account of the gathering in 1836. We hope these stories inspire young readers and those interested in learning ta rē Moriori at any age.

The stories have come to life through the keen ear and skills of our language interpreter Kiwa Hammond along with the creative team at Cognition Ltd, led by Bill Gaynor.



Language App Launch

Thank you to those members who have already downloaded our new ta rē language app. It is currently available on Android devices free through GooglePlay store. We are still waiting in anticipation for the release of the Iphone version once testing is completed and we will let members know once this is available.

All members should have received a card wallet which can be placed on a mobile phone or device to hold business cards or is convenient for your eftpos card. The wallet features our language app logo, and feedback to date has been positive - that they are a great talking point about the revival of our language.

Mātāriki Hākari and Hūnau Celebration


